For soup kitchen guests like Pete, the Open Door is a ministry of real help in desperate circumstances.

Last August, after Pete suffered a traumatic injury that placed him in the hospital for months, he lost his job and the credit on his food assistance card, which helps supplement his groceries each month. After several delays, the reinstatement for his food card was pushed back even further. Pete was frustrated and worried about the uncertainty of where he would receive his next meal.

At Midland's Open Door, Pete received not only a hot meal each day, but also a take-home sack lunch which included a second full meal to carry him through each evening.

"I was literally taking home the sack lunch and eating it for dinner every day," Pete said.

While eating lunch at the soup kitchen, Pete also connected with Open Door's Outreach Case Manager, who helped him advocate with the state of Michigan to restore the credit on his food card for the following month.

"I am truly blessed by the Lord because the Open Door kept me alive for the whole month of August this year," Pete said.

A New Identity



When Andrea arrived at the Women and Children's Crisis Shelter with her children on a frigid January day, the knowledge that she had found a place to stay was an instant emotional relief.

"Being a parent, being homeless – it breaks down your character," Andrea said.

The heavy burden of searching for a warm bed at night, or for a meal at the dinner table, vanished. Yet there was another fear that sometimes replaced those worries, even as opportunities and second chances lined up for Andrea and her family: the anxiety of stigmas, stereotypes and perceptions.

Andrea grew up in a large, low-income family, and she was often bullied as a child because of where she called home. Now a grown woman and a mother, it was hard to detach herself from that identity and the fear that being homeless made her someone's idea of a "bad mom." She'd resisted seeking shelter for weeks; placing her children with relatives, she couch-surfed instead.

But Andrea's decision to call the Open Door for shelter was a call she made not just for herself, but for her kids, to make sure they were safe and could continue to be a family together.

"I'm just trying to make a better life," Andrea said. "You can't give up."

While Andrea and her children stayed at the shelter, Andrea connected not only with a new supportive community, but also with her faith. Her perspective started shifting focus, and instead of fixating on what other people saw when they looked at her, Andrea fixed her eyes on Christ and her identity in him.

"Midland's Open Door opened up my eyes to know Jesus," Andrea said. "I wouldn't be here without him."

After a few months in shelter, Andrea and her family secured housing. As Andrea began the hard work of adjusting to life outside of the crisis shelter, it felt like everything was falling into place.

"I started crying," Andrea shared. "I did it! I made that first step, and it was like, 'I can do this.""

Andrea still stops by the Open Door for support and to catch up with friends.

"When I'm around here, I get compliments, and I'm not used to that. I'm used to the door slamming in my face," Andrea said. "It feels like a family, like my long-lost family."

Andrea and her children are still adjusting to all that life has in store for them, but with her new supportive community and her faith in God, she is full of hope.

"Baby steps first," Andrea said. "I put my full trust in God; it's proven to work."

CARES Act Extension

Taxpayers who take the standard deduction may deduct up to \$300 (\$600 for joint filers) for cash donations made to Midland's Open Door. For those who itemize, cash donations will be deductible up to 100 percent of adjusted gross income for 2021 (the previous deduction was 60 percent).

Gift from your IRA

If you're 70 ½ years old or older, you can give up to \$100,000 from your IRA to Midland's Open Door, reducing your taxable income while fulfilling your required minimum distributions. Please consult your financial advisor to determine your best giving options.
